

Q. After you heard what the trouble was?

A. Well, I did not take it very hard, but I was not much surprised, and it was nothing to get excited about, or anything like that.

BY COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Q. Did you have any ill effects after the treatment? Did you feel hot after taking it? A. No, I did not; I cannot say I did.

Q. It did not affect you very much at all? A. I understood from other patients that I would be sick after the first two or three treatments, but I was not. It did not affect me that way at all.

Q. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: You are not under any obligation to permit me to examine you.

THE WITNESS: All right.

COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: It is simply a favour to us.

THE WITNESS: Yes. It is all right, Commissioner.

8 ROLAND G. LONG, called,
(286 Edinborough St. Peterboro)

BY COMMISSIONER WALLACE:

Q. Mr. Long, you reside at 286 Edinborough Street, Peterboro? A. Yes.

COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Mr. Long's clinic cards will be Exhibit 9, attached together.

BY COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Q. You were before the
chief military officer of the military district in
Peterboro in 1936, in the month of July, and had a
diagnosis there, Mr. Long? A. Yes.

Q. The diagnosis of Mr. T. A. Carson was cancer
of the prostate. That was up at Christie Street
Hospital in Toronto? A. Yes.

Q. How does Peterboro come into it? A. That
was Dr. Walsh examined me, and sent me to the Christie
Street Hospital.

Q. You got the diagnosis in Christie Street
Hospital? A. Yes. I heard about Miss Caisse, and
I wrote to Dr. Carson. Dr. Carson wrote back a letter
and Miss Caisse has it some place. He said "Now, Miss
Caisse has done some wonderful work", and did not
approve or disapprove of her, and if I wished to go up
I could. I came, and I have been here ten months,
close on to two years.

Q. That letter was sent to the Secretary of the
Ex-service men's club by Dr. Carson, that is Mr.
Watley. In connection with Miss Caisse's treatment, do
you know of that, or did he speak to you directly about
it? Q. Well, he sent me the letter, -- my
letter came from Dr. Carson.

Q. There is a record of a letter here to Mr.
Watley? A. Yes.

Q. And he states the same thing as you? *Yes*

A. Yes.

Q. You came here then in 1936, in the month of July?

A. Yes.

Q. Before that time you had no treatment in hospital for this trouble?

A. No. I was up

before a board of doctors at Christie Street, and up before Dr. Paul, the specialist, and he said to me, "Now, Mr. Long, I am going to send you back home again", and "We have decided not to operate, but maybe a year from now I will have to operate on you". I am going to leave it at the present time".

I happened to look in our local paper, -- I did not know anything about Miss Caisse at that time, -- and I read that a fellow had been cured by her, and he had a letter in the paper stating he had been cured and proved to be cured. I wrote to her, and she wrote back to say that if I got permission from my doctor and to state the case, she would take it. I went to Dr. Carson and that is the letter I had back.

Q. Did you take continuous treatment?

A. I did up until about a year ago.

Q. Since that time none? A. No, I have not had any since.

Q. So that you came up today simply to give evidence? A. Yes.

Q. You are not taking any treatments today?

A. No.

Q. What was the result of the treatments you took?

Am

A. Well, I am feeling all right now. I am up to my normal weight a year ago, 134 or 135, and I am standing at that weight today.

Q. Are you feeling well? A. Yes, I am feeling fine now.

Q. Have you any difficulty of any kind? A. No. The stream has never been normal as it used to be before I took this thing, but there is no trouble about it at all.

BY COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Q. Do you have to get up at night? A. Sometimes, yes.

Q. You can go through the night without getting up? A. Yes. Sometimes I do, and sometimes I do not; it is just according. Sometimes I drink more than other times.

BY COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Q. Have you any pain now at all? A. No.

Q. You discontinued treatment because you felt that you had improved? A. Yes. Miss Gaisse thought I did not need any more treatment.

Q. Miss Gaisse thought you did not need any more treatments? A. Yes, sir.

Q. Did the treatments affect you in any way, directly after taking them? A. Yes. I will tell you, that after I took the treatment a few hours, after -- well, mostly when I got back home in the evening, they used to make me feel kind of flushed, like I had a heavy cold coming on, for about a couple of hours or

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so. I used to go to bed, and it worked off.

Q. Any perspiration? A. No, no perspiration.

Q. Just a chill? A. No, it seemed to be

a flushed feeling. That is the way it made me feel;
a little flushed.

Q. You were all right in the morning?

A. Yes.

Q. Did you take them once or twice a week?

A. Once a week, I did take them twice a week for a
little while.

Q. You do not know exactly how many treatments
you have taken?

A. No, I could not
tell you. Fifty-four, -- Miss Caisse will tell you
that. I have not that information. I would like you
to see Miss Rudd that Dr. Franks brought up. She is
waiting outside.

Q. She is going back with you? A. Yes.

Q. He has an appointment and will have to get
back.

COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Will you see to that now.

THE WITNESS: Yes.

COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Someone came with him, and
they are going back together. I was going to suggest
that we adjourn now, but we, I think, should finish
the lady first.

COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Yes.
