

COMMISSIONER YOUNG: Q. How old are you?

A. I am 67 last June.

MR. MURPHY: A section was taken and diagnosed as carcinoma, Dr. S. W. Thomson, Toronto General Hospital.

THE CHAIRMAN: Page 33 of the exhibits.

COMMISSIONER VALIN: Papillary epidermoid carcinoma.

MR. MURPHY: Papillary epidermoid carcinoma proven by biopsy by Dr. Gordon, What is your history about this matter? A. It just started from a bruise.

Q. Where, on the face? A. Yes.

Q. When? A. About three years ago.

Q. What happened? A. It got worse when I was away up north in Timmins, and the doctor there advised me to go to Toronto so I came.



Q. Yes, what happened? A. Well, they removed it in the General -

Q. Did they remove the growth or remove a section to see what was wrong with it? A. They removed the growth.

Q. Yes, alright, then what happened? A. Well, it started again.

Q. It started again.

COMMISSIONER VALIN: Q. When was it removed the first time? A. About two years ago.

COMMISSIONER YOUNG: September, 1937.

MR. MURPHY: Was that diagnosis filed?

COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: There was just a clinic card, the card that is kept in the clinic.

COMMISSIONER YOUNG: I understand it was in September of 1937 and he had irradiation following that. Is that so? A. I had radium three or four days after.

Q. After this section, or whatever it was, was removed you had radium treatment immediately?

A. Yes, There was just a small lump inside.

Q. And then in November of that same year you went to Miss Caisse; is that correct?

A. Yes.

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. Following up Dr. Young why did you go to Miss Caisse in November of 1937?

A. It started to spread.

Q. Started to spread? A. Yes.

Q. It came back again? A. It came back.

COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Q. Whereabouts

A. You looked at in in Bracebridge.

a scald now, It is dead.

Q. Are you taking any treatment now?

A. I am still taking treatment.

Q. How many have you taken all told, approximately?

A. About 16 or 18.

Q. Pardon? A. about 16 or 18, probably 20.

Q. Did you ever chew tobacco, Mr. Giles?

A. All my life.

Q. I didn't think you had cancer if you chewed  
tobacco. A. I got it from a bruise.
