BY COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Q. Did you go to any doctor before you came here? A. I went to three.

Q. You went to three? A. Yes.

Q. Who were they? A. (No audible answer,)

BY COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Q. Who were the doctors? A. Dr. Parke of Coldwater; Dr. Hall of Wabashene, and Dr. Boyd of Coldwater, but he did not do anything for me.

Q. What did he tell you was wrong?

A. Dr. Boyd did not tell me very much, but Dr. Parke told me it was a form of cancer.

BY COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Q. Then you went to Dr. Bastedo in Bracebridge? A. No, I never saw him.

COMMISSIONER WALLACE: There is a mistake some place here. This man's name is Walter Lawson, and we have nothing from the medical men about him.

BY COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Q. Where was this? A. It first started on here, and I had another one at the side of my eye (indicating). This one has all disappeared (indicating), and this other one is down to a little thing here (indicating).

Q. Did you have an operation there?

A. No sir, nothing; just the treatment I got here. I used all kinds of salves before I came here, but they did not do any good.

Q. Did it start up here somewhere (indicating)?

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A. It was all the way up there.

Q. And that is the only treatment you had of it?

A. Except I used some salves and stuff that I got from doctors, and druggists, and it did not go any good.

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COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Dr. Wallace, would you just look at this.

COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Yes, I see.

BY COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Q. Did that protrude, or was it raised up?

A. (No audible answer.)

Q. Was there a big lump there? A. No, sir.

apparently healed over, Miss Caisse?

MISS CAISSE: Yes.

section taken off it.

MISS CAISSE: Not that I know of.

COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Did it protrude?

MISS CAISSE: Yes. It was at the beginning -- it
was straight down like that (demonstrating).

MISS CAISSE: Yes.

healed (indicating)?

healing as well.

BY COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Q. You are carrying on
your usual work, are you? A. Yes.

Q. What do you do? A. I cannot do/much as
I used to.

Q. What are you working at? A. Oh, I

all with this, have you? A. Oh, nothing to speak

of, no, unless I happen to hit it on something.

Q. I see. Did your treatment affect you

immediately after?

A. The first couple of

times I took it/did, and it kind of upset my stomach,

but in a couple of hours more it did not bother me.

Q. It just bothered your stomach, nothing else?

A. No. The hypo spots would be sore for a day or two.

Q. Quite naturally?

A. Yes.

Q. Well, I think that is all I can get from you, unless Dr. Callahan has anything more to ask you.

COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: I just wanted Miss Caisse to describe that area to me. That is all, thank you.
