

24 34, TONY BAZIUK, sworn.

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. What is your occupation?

A. My occupation, engine watchman.

Q. You are from Capreol, Ontario? A. Yes.

Q. What do you work at? A. I work in the round house.

Q. What was your trouble? A. I was having cancer of my lip.

Q. You had cancer on your lip? A. Yes, right over here.

Q. Who told you you had cancer on your lip?

A. Dr. McNeil at London, Ontario.

THE CHAIRMAN: Q. Dr. George McNeil? A. London, Ontario.

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. Did you have radium treatment?

COMMISSIONER YOUNG: When was that diagnosis?

MR. MURPHY: I may find that out, doctor --

THE CHAIRMAN: Dr. McNeil is a radiologist and probably gave the X-ray.

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. Why didn't you take treatment in Capreol? A. They didn't have no radium and X-ray. The doctor didn't have everything prepared like a big place.

COMMISSIONER YOUNG: Q. When did you go to Dr. McNeil?

A. I went to Dr. McNeil I think three years ago.

Q. And had somebody before that said you had cancer of the lip? A. I was at Dr. Mitchell.

Q. That is how long ago?

A. That is about

three years ago I was coming to Toronto. I came and saw
Dr. Mitchell.

THE CHAIRMAN: Q. He is the C. N. R. doctor, is he? *

A. Yes.

MR. MURPHY: Here is some information at page 333
of exhibit 48, Mr. Tony Baziuk. This was the questionnaire
sent out by Dr. Noble. "Apparently lip is healed with
very slight scar".

" In your opinion, was the patient benefited by Miss
Caisse's treatment? He states that he received
two injections, one in arm, and another in lip, and
left immensely benefited almost immediately."

Is that so?

A. That is right.

Q. Is that correct?

A. That is correct.

I have first treated from Miss Caisse in the right arm
and she gave me application at the same time on my lip
and my lip started to go down, and I have my treatment
at ten o'clock, and at twelve o'clock I have my dinner.
One week before I went to Miss Caisse I was having
radium treatment at London, and my lip is made worse.

Q. Your lip was made worse?
me worse.

A. Yes made

COMMISSIONER YOUNG: Q. When did you first go to Miss
Caisse?

A. The first time I go after I have
treatment.

Q. How long ago was that?
afterwards.

A. Three weeks

Q. When did you have your treatment? The diagnosis

was made three years ago. Dr. Mitchell said you had cancer of the lip three years ago? A. Yes.

Q. Then how soon did you have any X-rays or radium?

A. I went Tuesday and Friday-- they told me to wait till Friday, and I go in for radium treatment at London, Ontario.

COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN; Q. You had radium treatment at London? A. Yes.

COMMISSIONER YOUNG: Q. Did you have several treatments? A. I have once.

Q. Just one treatment only? A. I have one treatment and then he told me to come every week there. This is Friday I have treatment and he is going to have it examined again. I came up again and it was the same shape. The lip was swelled up. I couldn't eat anything and it burned my gum inside and my teeth started shaking. Half the tongue was burned. I couldn't eat anything, and I just had milk. *

Q. How soon after that did you see Miss Caisse?

A. Three weeks afterwards I left London. I didn't go no more. I met a fellow at Toronto station, Frank Morris. I met him in the station here and he says "you look funny". He knows me well and he says "what is the matter with you" I said "I have cancer on my lip" "Well" he says, "what you got to do"? I said "I have radium treatment". "Well", he says, "I wouldn't" He says "you should go to Bracebridge". He says "there is a nurse up there and she has helped lots of people and she is going to help you, too."

I said " Well, I tell you, I don't have any money. I cannot go no place --

Q. How long did Miss Caisse treat you?

A. She gave me six treatments. The first treatment I got, at ten o'clock she gave me through the arm the needle and the same stuff she put in my lip and she told me to close my lip and to hold it for a few minutes. I held my lip and I feel my lip go down. At twelve o'clock I have my first dinner and I went home next morning to Capreol. I got home at seven o'clock and I wake the wife up out of bed and I said " get up and fix my breakfast. I am hungry", and she says " is something wrong" --

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. You are cured now?

A. That is the way I am feeling because nothing bothers me. I sleep and eat and work every day.

Q. You haven't got a sore? A. I don't feel no sores at all.

Q. Now, on page 334 there is statement obviously by Dr. Mitchell -- I am not sure who it is by. It is one in answer to one of Dr. Noble's questionnaires.

" What were the clinical findings in this case? Carcinoma of the right lower lip.

What were the laboratory findings in this case?

Wasserman - Negative

What were the Post Mortem findings in this case?

None.

In your opinion, was the patient benefited by Miss Caisse's treatment?

Have no information.

* Was the patient ever treated by deep X-ray, radium or surgery? If so, when?

September 1, 1936 - Under local anaesthesia, five gold radon seeds were implanted around and beneath the lesion 1 cm. apart. These were of 1.6 MC. strength. Total Dose 8 M. C.

Date.. Dec. 10th, 1937. Sgd.... George McNeill"

THE CHAIRMAN: That would be Dr. McNeill's treatment because he is a radiologist.

MR. MURPHY: " Remarks " January, 1936 - A small lesion started as a so-called blister and gradually became hard and indurated.

September 1, 1936, - The lesion had reached an area of 1.5 x 1 cm. It was distinctly elevated. There was no glandular involvement.

September 10, 1936 - Patient returned for examination. There was a well developed radium reaction and patient was requested to return in two weeks.

October 2, 1936 - Good radium reaction. Healing taking place. Patient failed to report for further examination, but considering the reaction and the behaviour of the lesion undoubtedly a good result would be obtained. "

COMMISSIONER YOUNG: So that he really did have more than one radium treatment.

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. Did you have more than one radium treatment? A. Just one, just once.

Q. You just had one? A. One, that is all.

Q. Have they got you mixed up with some other Baziuk?

THE CHAIRMAN: Q. You saw the doctor twice after you got the treatment? A. I seen the doctor twice, and then I left and didn't go no more.

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. Now, did Dr. Mitchell say anything to you about Miss Caisse's treatment?

A. I was asking him because I said I heard of a person at Bracebridge.

Q. After it was over when you went back to him?

A. Yes, he asked me.

Q. Did Dr. Mitchell say "well, she cured you but don't go around telling everybody? What did he say?

A. He said "you are cured, you feel good now". He said "that is alright".

Q. Alright.
