5 COMMISSIONER WALLACE: A report from the Public Health Laboratory, dated December 7th, 1937.

A. Right there (indicating). You can see a sort of small red mark, if you look very closely.

25 Q. Did you have any other treatment?

A. No.

Q. Did you put any salve on it, or anything?

A. No, just a solution she gave me.

Q. That is the only treatment you had?

Q. Did you have some injections? A. Yes,  
in the arm. Serum it is, I guess.

Q. How many treatments did you have?

A. Well, I do not know how many I have had.

COMMISSIONER WALLACE: She has had 25 treatments.

COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: "Injections".

THE WITNESS: I believe I must have had more than  
that.

COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Until February 4th, 1939,  
the statement says 25 treatments.

THE WITNESS: Something around there.

BY COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Injections?

A. Yes, in the arm, -- in both arms, rather.

Q. And a local application? A. Yes,  
and her medicine to drink. She give you that before  
every treatment.

Q. A blood purifier? A. Yes.

Q. How much do you get of that? A. You  
only get a glass every time you take the treatment.

Q. You get a glass of blood purifier?

A. Yes.

Q. With each injection? A. Yes.

COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Thank you very much.

THE WITNESS: I can certainly say I feel a lot  
better now than when I first came here, anyway. I am  
from Uppington.

BY COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Q. How many miles is  
that? A. 12 miles, I think.
