

BY COMMISSIONER YOUNG: Q. Where was the X-ray work done? A. At Bracebridge.

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. At the Memorial Hospital? A. I think that is the name of it.

BY COMMISSIONER YOUNG: Q. Well, this stuff which came away; what did it look like to you?

A. Well, if I may go back to the farm way of talking, it looked as if you had castrated a beef, and had to open it again. Something like the fistula on a horse.

Q. A soft creamy stuff? A. Yes.

BY COMMISSIONER DEADMAN: Q. Are you still taking treatments? A. Not as if I really felt as if I needed to take treatments, but I do take an occasional treatment. I had a treatment last winter when this Board was up there at Bracebridge, and I had a treatment there last Saturday, but I have had no recurrence of pain or anything.

I hope you can do something for her, not only for me but for everybody else.

31 JOHN McALEE, sworn

BY COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Q. Did I not see you at the station at Bracebridge? A. Yes, you saw me the day before that, too.

BY THE CHAIRMAN: Q. His evidence is at page 89.

BY COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Q. Where do you live?

A. Our post office is R. R. Utterson -- R. R. No. 1

BY COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Q. You gave evidence up there? A. Yes, sir.

MR. MURPHY: The only point about the evidence is this, that this man had secondary growth, and it was removed three years previous by Dr. McGibbon, and then came back on him. I do not think that is in the evidence That is the reason for calling him again.

Q. Were you operated on? A. Yes.

Q. What did you have, cancer of the lip.

A. Yes, that is what it was reckoned to be

Q. Who told you? A. The late Dr.

McGibbon cut it out.

BY COMMISSIONER YOUNG: Q. In 1935?

A. Oh, no, it was before that. It was fourteen or fifteen years between the times.

BY COMMISSIONER WALLACE: Nineteen years ago he said in his evidence.

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. You had it removed by Dr. McGibbon? A. Yes, sir.

Q. And how many years after -- A. Fifteen or eighteen years.

Q. -- it came back? A. Yes.

Q. And then what did you do? A. I went to Dr. McGibbon again, and he wanted to send me to Toronto.

Q. For what purpose? A. For radium treatment.

Q. And what did he say it was?

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A. He did not say. He said, "You had better go to Toronto". He had said before that that he thought it would be cancer, but he said I should go to Toronto for radium treatment, but I did not care about going, and I wanted him to give me permission to go to Miss Caisse, and he did not want to do that. I went to Miss Caisse anyway, and she gave me some medicine to put on.

Q. Did you get any injection in the arm?

A. No, no injections at all.

Q. Did it clear up? A. Yes, it cleared up, just as you see it now. It lasted about seven months.

Q. Had it grown as it had previously when Dr. McGibbon took it off? A. Yes, just about the same thing.

Q. Just about the same thing? A. Yes.

Q. But it is better now? A. Yes.

Q. The growth has disappeared? A. Yes, every thing.

BY COMMISSIONER CALLAHAN: Q. Was it something like what you have on your hand? A. Oh no, it grew-- not, it was not like that (indicating)

BY COMMISSIONER YOUNG: Q. Previously had you any other treatment except the application of something externally? A. Yes.

A. (No audible answer.)

MR. MURPHY: Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER YOUNG: In that preparation which is used locally, is there any of this substance which she

uses hypodermatically? Is the same thing used in the hypodermics as is used for these local applications?

MR. McGAUGHEY: I think it is, but I will ask her, and check up on it.

32 MRS. RACHEL WHITMORE, sworn

BY THE CHAIRMAN: Q. Where do you live?

A. I live at 37 Torrence Avenue, East York, Toronto.

MR. MURPHY: Was she examined in Bracebridge?

A. No.

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. You live in York County?

A. Yes, sir.

Q. When did you have any trouble with your health?

A. Just over four years ago.

Q. What was the nature of it? A. I

was bleeding from the front passage, and I went to Dr. Barnett.

BY COMMISSIONER YOUNG: Q. That is Dr. Barnett on Danforth Avenue? A. Yes, sir. He examined it,

and he said it was the commencing of a cancer-- a bleeding cancer.

BY MR. MURPHY: Q. And then what took place?

A. He gave me an order to go to the General Hospital, and they examined me there, and they put in about 7 or 8 radium needles --

Q. Radium? A. I suppose it was, I don't know.

But they filled the needles, and put in a local anaesthetic

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
